### Analysis:

The data collected above is essential because it gives a clear picture of the school and its community. Reservoir High School is located in Fulton, MD, but only a small part of its student body actually comes from the town. The majority of the student population is bused in from North Laurel. This tells me that a large portion of students do not have the opportunity to spend extended time before or after school because they must abide by their bus time tables. Users will need flexible hours, like the lunch period, to allow them access to materials. Another observation is the number of families that do not speak English at home. It may be helpful to have some of the curricular texts written in other languages like Spanish and Chinese. This would allow students who do not speak English at home to access these texts in the language spoken at home. This also might improve parental involvement in their student's academics amongst the non-English speaking households. When I looked on the library shelves, I did not find many texts that were available in both English and another language. I think that this is an area that the library is going to need to improve upon as the population diversifies. These kinds of books could be useful when it comes to involving the community in what is being read in school.

Overall, the library does seem to be used and appreciated by the student body. With 25%-50% using it on any given week, the library is very busy. When you look at the circulation records, you see that the top two types of books checked out are Non-Fiction and Fiction. Librarians try to keep the library current by systematically targeting different sections of the library each year for weeding and replenishing. When talking with the librarians, they indicated that each section of the library is reviewed every three to four years. While not ideal, it does allow them to weed what is no longer relevant. They do not buy books that will be outdated quickly (computer/technology references) and instead, look for reliable internet sources their readers may use. I did notice that 40% of the media materials were published over 12 years ago and would not be considered "current" based on their copyright date. I think this is fairly common and is acceptable as long as the librarians review the books in their collection for accuracy on a regular basis.

One thing that is very impressive is the Fiction collection. There was great variety, meeting a variety of reading levels and genres of interest. The media center's collection contains books ranging from children's books to adult fiction. It

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has a substantial collection of graphic novels, poetry and short stories to meet the interest of its student population. Circulation statistics show that 36% of the books checked out on a daily basis are fiction. This tells me that they have a collection that peaks student interest. It is also evident that non-fiction resources are applicable to students' needs because 42% of daily checkouts are Non-Fiction. I expect that they will continue to focus on the books that are getting checked out and analyzing what makes those books appealing.

Five years from now, the library shelves will most likely be filled with the most up-to-date fiction as they seem to replenish this section each year. The Non-Fiction section will continue to be updated with the most attention paid to the 100s, 400s, and 900s as they are the oldest sections.

Overall, I was impressed with this library. It faces a lot of challenges with its diverse population, but I think that it is doing a good job at meeting those challenges. It is truly the hub of the school, and reflects the needs of its diverse population thorough its layout and content.
